Dear Chairman Brown, Ranking Member Toomey, Chairwoman Waters, Ranking Member McHenry, Chairman Leahy, Ranking Shelby, Chairwoman DeLauro, and Ranking Member Granger:

As Congress considers further investment in comprehensive infrastructure, we recognize the importance of rebuilding our roads, utilities, buildings, and related assets. Among the most impactful and relevant

infrastructure to American families, business, and communities is housing. Today, our nation faces an affordable housing crisis. Demands for housing consistently outweigh available units across urban, rural, and suburban settings. The need is evident—especially for low-income households, who increasingly spend more than a third of their incomes on housing. Without federal support, housing insecurity will only grow for families and individuals facing economic hardship and uncertainty. Further attention to this issue is needed through extensive federal investment. For this reason, we strongly urge Congress to consider significant funding to the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program as a part of a comprehensive infrastructure bill.

HOME's contribution to housing development in the past three decades has been significant. Since 1992, HOME has built and preserved over 1.33 million units of affordable housing. The program provides a significant return on investment with every dollar leveraging another \$4.51 in other public and private funding. In turn, the program has supported over 1.9 million jobs while generating \$124 billion in local income according to the HOME Coalition's most recent analysis.

The program is also often utilized alongside other federal and state programs dedicated to housing development including the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (Housing Credit). From 2010 to 2020, HOME funding of \$11.4 billion was invested in Housing Credit developments with an average of \$2.2 million in HOME spent in each Housing Credit project. Matched funds from public and private sources allow projects to reach completion and serve varying income levels and vulnerable populations. As a flexible program with many eligible activities, HOME is a reliable source of gap financing for housing development in varying jurisdictions.

As affordable housing needs have grown, federal support has only declined. HOME is currently funded at 25% less than in fiscal year (FY) 2010. These cuts have greatly hampered the program's ability to support needed affordable housing development. Over the last decade, affordable housing production through HOME decreased by 69%, reflecting substantial reductions in program funding.

HOME maintains a strong reputation as a useful funding source for housing preservation and production for low-income households. Its solid record of expanding affordable housing as well as reach across all fifty states makes it well-positioned for further investment. In considering certain programs and funding priorities in a supplemental package, we urge Congress to advance housing development through increased investment to HOME.
