CARES ACT 1- \$19,651,876 Focus on Microenterprises and Public Social Services

Grants awarded to 36 communities

CARES ACT 2- \$23,601,911

Focus on Microenterprises, Public Social Services, and Emergency Rental/Mortgage Assistance
\$2,801,911 to five communities
\$10.8 M to Massachusetts Growth Capital Corporation
\$10 M allocated to Emergency Rental and Mortgage
Assistance Program

CARES ACT 3- \$27,154,515

Focus on Food Insecurity

Grants awarded to 13 Community Foundations and MASSCAP

CARES Act

Waived limit of funds to support public social services

Able to contract to Non UGLGs

To address food insecurity across the entire state, MA partnered with a network of 13 Community Foundations (CFs) and 1 Community Action Agency to provide services at the local and regional level.

Program Types: local food banks, mobile markets, local food growing/ distribution, backpack food for students' evening meals, & healthy food access for housing authority residents.







In response to sustained needs reported by partners, \$6,404,404 in additional awards were made = Total of \$33,558,919

Funds allocated on a prorated basis by:

- 1) Poverty Score
- 2) SNAP Change Score
- 3) Covid Health Impact

2Gether We Eat's mission is to combat the food crisis and food deserts by providing food, education, workforce development, and employment opportunities year-round by growing food through indoor hydroponics systems.



Black Veteran founded 501(c)3 nonprofit organization



Educational programming for youth, teaching them how to use hydroponic farming to produce food for themselves and their families and they donate 100% of the crops to fight the food insecurities in the community.



2Gether We Eat

\$275,000 Award

- To purchase fully equipped Freight Farms from Freight Farms in Worcester, MA
- Vertical farm built entirely inside a 40-foot container.
- 500 plants germinated and be ready to put in the system upon arrival
- Grows up to 13,000 crops in 320 sf.
- Provides harvests 52 weeks a year/6 weeks yield crop.
- Worcester Community Action Council youth will assist in putting germinated plants in the system
- Community Crop distribution



Impact

- Addresses low food security
- Two to four tons' worth of crop yield annually will be donated and sold to community nonprofits
- 170 youth and adult learners educated annually
- Revenue earned from excess crop sales sustains the program
- Collaboration with other community organizations
- Delivers measurable results that will continue to grow well into the future
- Over 1,100 beneficiaries annually
