

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State Funding - Two parallel funding tracks

OPERATING - \$1.4B

- Homelessness response systems (pass-through to all counties and community organizations)
- Shelters assistance
- Rent assistance/eviction prevention programs
- Landlord mitigation
- PSH Operations, maintenance and supportive services

CAPITAL - \$770M, Portfolio of 56,000 units with \$1.8B investment

- Investments to construct, acquire or preserve multifamily/rental affordable housing, permanent supportive housing, and shelters
- First-time homebuyer assistance
- Highly competitive programs:
 - Coordination with local public funders
 - Awards announced each ~December
- Projects remain affordable for 40+ years (25 for homeownership)



Expensive to address homelessness when rents increase faster than lower incomes.

In 2010 55% of a lower income was needed to pay for a lower cost rental. 65% needed in 2023.

In 2010 89% of a federal disability check was needed to pay for a lower cost rental. 120% needed in 2023.

Enabling expanded supply of smaller, low-cost units is critical to addressing this primary driver of homelessness

Community must allow siting of shelters and Permanent Supportive housing to meet HB 1220 housing targets



Pre-Disaster Housing Initiative (PDHI)

Pre-Disaster Housing Initiative (PDHI) Overview

Invitation to participate in Cohort of 4 states over 6 months period.

The purpose of the joint FEMA and HUD initiative is to achieve the following:

- Facilitate collaboration on housing operations between a state's Emergency Management (EM) agency and its Housing agencies, during both steady state and following a disaster.
- Develop or mature a pre-disaster housing strategy or plan that will:
 - Identify the potential post-disaster housing stock that may be available;
 - Document strategies for housing options following a disaster; and
 - Create implementable strategies to provide resilient, affordable housing to survivors as soon as possible.

Pre-Disaster Housing Initiative (PDHI) Process

Washington State PDHI Project Work Plan

<u>Mission:</u> Utilize existing resources to refine and improve the state's Housing RSF, using lessons learned from real world disasters, state housing RSF exercises, other states' experience.

- Objective 1: Refine and improve the Washington Housing RSF to make it more accessible and beneficial to state and local partners.
- Objective 2: Create roadmap and action steps for strengthening state and local partnerships (state agencies, Gov office, local EMDs, local housing partners).

Lessons Learned

- Emergency Managers & Housing Experts don't often mix outside of occasional urgent disaster response
- We share a love of acronyms, but speak different languages
- Most disaster housing plans don't include input from housing experts (state or local level)
- Housing experts work all day every day responding to housing crises and there are already established systems of care in most communities to help people with urgent housing needs
- Housing organizations are largely not connected with emergency management departments
- Resources held by housers & EMers are mysterious to each other
- Most communities are already facing a housing shortage
- MASTT and Statewide Disaster Housing Coordinating Committee could fill some gaps

Post-disaster Housing Need Profiles

Households who can selfresolve

- Homeowners
- Have insurance
- Income continues through disaster
- Have means to pay for temporary housing
- Robust support network places to stay, resources (often out of area)

Households who need temporary or limited housing assistance

- Homeowners
- Have insurance
- Income continues through disaster
- May need temporary assistance with housing
- Some available support network – places to stay, resources

Households who need longterm housing assistance

- · Older homes or renters
- Under- or un-insured
- Lower or limited income without means to pay for temporary housing
- Income disrupted by disaster
- Support network limited or also affected by disaster

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Same population already at risk of housing instability predisaster; may be eligible for existing housing programs
