While federally declared disasters are addressed through CDBG-Disaster Recovery, the regular CDBG program offers opportunities to address smaller scale disasters. The Urgent Need national objective can be effective to assist communities in need. This funding method presents certain challenges that will be discussed.

New Housing Resources from 21st Century ROAD to Housing

This session will cover the 21st Century ROAD to Housing Act provisions for HOME modernization and reauthorization as well as the environmental review and Section 3 streamlining. The Act directs HUD to take steps to improve BABA implementation and coordinate housing with other federal agencies (USDA & VA). There are many other new housing provisions that will impact the work of state housing managers. COSCDA staff and members will provide an overview and the latest information on implementation of the Act.

Developing Policies and Procedures for Housing Programs

A Policies and Procedures manual is important for HOME and HTF to provide clear operational guidelines and assure compliance with regulations for these programs. The updated HOME rule warrants attention to create such a manual, if a state does not have one, or update any that do exist. This session will have COSCDA members share their experience in developing such a manual and may include best practices information from a technical assistance provider.

State Housing Plans and Initiatives

Several states have launched a state housing plan or initiatives to guide statewide housing development. In light of the concerns about affordable housing and with the passage of the 21st Century ROAD to Housing Act, this session will provide examples of how states are innovating and marshaling their resources to address housing affordability.

Data-Driven Selection of HOME and HTF Applicants

States have different approaches in application selection for housing projects for the HOME program and Housing Trust Fund supported developments. Quantitative data can be used in many different ways, and other qualitative factors often weigh in too. COSCDA members will share their experience and the criteria used to select the best applications for federal housing funding.

Update on 21st Century ROAD to Housing Act

Several states have launched a state-level interagency council on homelessness (ICH) to coordinate and guide multiple state agencies that provide assistance to persons experiencing homelessness. This session will provide overviews of the operation and focus of state ICHs. The coordination and activities of states with an ICH can offer ideas and opportunities for states without an ICH to collaborate with their partner state agencies.

Challenges of Merging CoCs and/or Connecting HMIS Systems

Merging homelessness Continuums of Care (CoCs) can face multiple challenges as different systems may have varying standards and practices. Coordinating among diverse stakeholders and aligning their objectives can complicate the integration process. Additionally, while there are significant benefits to connecting Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS), ensuring data quality and addressing different system procedures can thwart the desired coordination improvements. COSCDA members will share their experience in implementing these efforts.

Housing Navigation & Landlord Engagement

Programs that help families and individuals experiencing homelessness to secure housing are critical resources. Providing information and support to landlords and property managers assists in expanding the pool of available and affordable housing. Hiring a contractor that fails to deliver creates many headaches. Promises go unmet; firms that looked strong on paper arrive with inexperienced and non-dedicated staff, and agencies are left managing the program and the contractor. This session will help COSCDA members improve the effectiveness of their RFP process. This discussion will focus on setting clear expectations, strengthening accountability, and ensuring contractors deliver the team, capacity, and services promised. The session will also cover best practices for developing cost estimates, a critical step in supporting fair pricing, informed evaluation, and stronger procurement outcomes.

Breakout Session D

Mapping to Support CDBG-DR Compliance

Geographic information systems (GIS) can be an effective management tool to support Disaster Recovery. COSCDA members will share their expertise and ideas for using mapping programs to manage compliance requirements ranging from national objectives, to Safe Housing Incentives program, duplication of benefits, and reporting. With the right data and policies, interacting with maps can be not only useful visual supporting documentation but a key tool for making compliance determinations.
